Deuteronomy 1:1-8, 19-40 Gifting and Taking



Think about and discuss one or two questions from each section.

The text – Deuteronomy 1:1-8; 19-40

- 1. Read Deuteronomy 1:1-8; 19-40. The first couple of verses in this chapter introduce the context in which Deuteronomy occurs. Where are the people of Israel when Moses beings to speak (1:1-2, 5)? How long ago did the events of the Exodus occur (1:3)?
- 2. In 1:5, Moses begins to teach. The book of Deuteronomy is largely made up of three sermons from Moses before he dies (Deuteronomy 34). In 1:6-8 he remembers what happened at Mount Horeb (also known as Mount Sinai) some 40 years ago. What are the main points he makes in 1:6-8?
- 3. In 1:19-40, Moses remembers what happened after the people had arrived at Kadesh Barnea. What were the main reasons Israel rebelled against the LORD God at that time?
- 4. Discuss why God's gift of the land still had to be taken. What is the relationship between "gift" and "take"?

The Scriptures – Deuteronomy 1:1-8; 19-40 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 5. There are many important NT reflections on the generation of Israel that rebelled against God and did not enter the land of promise. Read, for example, Hebrews 3:7-14 (in which the writer uses a portion of Psalm 95). What are the main points the writer is making about Christian life and discipleship?
- 6. God gives the kingdom to his people (Luke 12:32-34). He gifts the Holy Spirit to his people. However, in spiritual battle we still have to take action to stand against evil. Read and discuss Ephesians 6:10-17 in this light. What has to be taken or taken up?
