The Blemished Priest: Excluded? Instructive?



Getting Started

In his recent discussion paper about future directions for our churches, Rod wrote:

• L'Arche – L'Arche (The Ark) provides us with an international model of caring residential communities from which we can learn a great deal. Jean Vanier and others founded L'Arche in France in 1964. By the time of Vanier's death on 7 May 2019, L'Arche had been established in more than 30 countries throughout the world, including Australia. Among L'Arche's aims is "to make known the gifts of people with intellectual disabilities revealed through mutually transforming relationships".

It is our intention to develop inclusive, residential places on the Springwood site. These will be homes in which those who are vulnerable are known, loved, celebrated, and safe. These will be homes embedded in Christian generosity and hospitality. We do not intend becoming members of L'Arche. However we can learn a great deal from the journey L'Arche has taken. • The Springwood and Winmalee churches – over past years our church communities in Winmalee and Springwood have sought to welcome and love those who are vulnerable, and those who have experienced rejection and exclusion within wider society. Consider already existing ministry commitments, including our partnership with Jericho Road, playgroups, Restore meetings, Open Church, and more recently William's Place. Consider the participation of many of our members in caring for refugees, people in prisons, those who are homeless, those who are in nursing homes etc. Our intention to develop inclusive accommodation on the Springwood site is fully in keeping with the way the Lord has been guiding us over the past years.

• The accent on Lev 21 is sacred space: now fulfilled in Jesus who is the place where we meet God.

- The church is also an expression of sacred space.
- We look forward to a new creation without blemish, because of Jesus.
