Exodus 19-20 God: the consuming and life-giving fire



What is your most positive and negative experience of fire?

The text - Exodus 19-20

- 1. There is an ongoing tension between being near God and being unable to be near him in this passage. In what ways are the people near God in Exodus 19:1–6?
- 2. In what ways are the people unable to be near God? See Exodus 19:7-25 and 20:18-21.
- 3. What is Moses' experience of being near God? What does this mean for his relationship with the people?
- 4. What does God want Israel's relationship with him to be like? Exodus 20:1-7
- 5. What kind of society does God want Israel to be? Exodus 20:8-17.

The Scriptures – Exodus 19–20 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 6. The tension between nearness and distance is an ongoing one across the Bible. What can we learn about the tension in Exodus 40:1–38; John 1:1–18; Hebrews 10:19–25; 12:18–28?
- 7. How does Jesus develop or explain the commandments given by Moses? See Matthew 5:17–48.
- 8. How can laws from God become evidence of God's consuming fire rather than his life-giving fire? See Galatians 3:1–22.
- 9. Consider how Jesus is like the God of Exodus 19–20. How is he like Moses? How is he like an Israelite?

Our lives – walking the way of Jesus in response to Exodus 19–20 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 10. Is God more like a life-giving or a consuming fire in your experience? Do you feel drawn to God or fearful of him in Ex 19–20?
- 11. What role (if any) do the Ten Commandments have in your life?
- 12. What is your response to Hebrews 12:28-29?
