- 3. Read Luke 15:1-2.
 - What's been happening between Jesus, the religious leaders and the outcasts so far in Luke's Gospel?
- 4. Read the three stories about lost things in Luke 15:3–31. What are the similarities and differences between the shepherd, the woman and the father?
- 5. One commentator has proposed that the shepherd represents Jesus, the woman and the lamp represent the Holy Spirit and the father represents God the Father. What do you think?
- 6. Who rejoices in the stories? Why?
- 7. What are some of the scandalous elements in the third story? Why does Jesus include these?
- 8. Look carefully at the language the older brother uses to describe his family and relationships in Luke 15:25–32. What do you notice?

The Scriptures – Luke 15:1-32 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 9. How might the picture of a shepherd relate to Ezekiel 34:1–16 and Psalm 23?
- 10. What connections can you find between the teaching in Deuteronomy 21:15–21 and Luke 15:11–31?
- 11. How does Luke 15 relate to the story of Jesus travelling to Jerusalem in Luke 9–19?
