Ephesians 4: 17-32



The text – Ephesians 4:17-32

- 1. Read Ephesians 4:17–19. Why is Paul's language so strong?
- 2. What are the characteristics of futile, Gentile thinking?
- 3. Read Ephesians 4:20–24. What processes have changed things for the Ephesians?
- 4. Paul writes of 'the old man/human' and 'the new man/human'. Some understand this to be two natures inside each Christian. Some understand this to be like two teams or two eras. What are the strengths and weaknesses of these approaches?
- 5. What is the importance of the expression, 'created to be like God' (v24)?
- 6. Read Ephesians 4:25–32. Make a list of (i) things we should do (ii) things we shouldn't do and (iii) the reasons that connect or explain these.
- 7. Is there a big theme that keeps coming up in Paul's practical teaching? (In the sermon, Kirk thought fullness and unity were big ideas. What do you think?)

The Scriptures – Ephesians 4: 17-32 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 8. Isaiah hoped for a day when people would leave dark and futile ways behind. What makes the change possible? Consider Isa 32:1–8; 35:1–10.
- 9. What are the two ways of living in Romans 8:5–11? Does this help explain the old and the new self/humanity in Ephesians?

Our lives – walking the way of Jesus in response to Ephesians 4: 17-32 as a portion of the Scriptures

- 10. Have there been times in your life when you have lived with futile, Gentile thinking? Are you still drawn to it?
- 11.Is there an aspect of behaviour in 4:25–32 that God seems to be working on in your life? How can you draw on your relationship with God and with his people to help you change in this area?
- 12. Do you see evidence of God's generous fullness and unifying love in the lives of people you know? Could you tell them what you see?
